Information about the holidays featured in this book

First Day at School (Pages 8–10)

Most American children start school with preschool or kindergarten. They move up through elementary school, middle school and high school. Four out of five finish high school, and many continue with vocational or college studies. American high school students take examinations called SATs (Scholastic Aptitude Tests) if they want to go to college. The majority of US schools are public schools, funded by taxes, and students attend them free.

10% of US students go to private elementary schools.

Labor Day (Pages 11–12)

Labor Day is the first Monday in September. It was first suggested by Peter J. McGuire, founder of the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and the first big parade was held in New York City in 1882. In 1887 several other states passed laws making the first Monday of September Labor Day. Workers get the day off work. There are parades, and speeches by labor leaders and political figures.

Citizenship Day (Page 13)

September 17 is the day on which the United States Constitution was signed in 1787. Previously, each state acted independently – it printed its own money, made its own laws and had its own army. There were many disagreements between the different states about the Constitution: the northern states wanted to stop the slave trade; some states wanted to have a president who would be president for life; some states worried about losing their independence. Eventually, by arguing and by studying the constitutions of other countries, they reached agreement. To become an American citizen, a person must be 18 years old; he or she must enter the United States legally and live in the country for five years (three if married to a US citizen), have a good moral character, understand basic English, and understand the basic history of the United States. He/she must promise to support the Constitution and obey the laws of the US.

Columbus Day (Pages 14–15)

Celebrated in the United States on the second Monday in October, Columbus Day is the anniversary of October 12, 1492, when Christopher Columbus was officially thought to have arrived in America. It is becoming the most controversial American holiday. Some celebrate it with great patriotism and nostalgia; others celebrate Discovery Day in its place. Others simply refuse to celebrate it at all. Protests from Native American groups have increased. (How could Columbus have "discovered" a country where people were already living?) The association between Columbus and America took root in the imagination in the eighteenth century. Americans, searching for a history and a hero, discovered Columbus. He was a hero because he, like them, had escaped the Old World tyranny. He was the solitary individual who challenged the unknown sea. Now, for most people, Columbus Day is an official holiday when schools close and there are large sales in stores.

Halloween (Pages 16–18)

Halloween is celebrated on October 31. It was originally a Celtic festival of the dead, known as Samhain. The Christian Church tried to suppress this pagan festival, renaming it All Hallows' Eve (hence the name Hallowe'en). However, today the festival is very popular in the US. Pumpkin lanterns (jack-o'-lanterns), masks and spooky costumes are all part of Halloween, as is the custom of trick-or-treating where children go from house to house dressed in costume and are given candy as a treat. If no candy is forthcoming, they play a trick (mostly harmless) on the owners. Many people have parties where adults and children dress up.

Election Day (Pages 19–20)

Election Day is the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November. It's a legal holiday in many states. On this day Americans elect government leaders for their cities, states, courts and nation. Every four years Americans elect a president and a vice-president for a four-year term starting on the following January 20th. No president can be elected more than twice in a row. If the president dies in office or cannot complete the term, the vice-president becomes president.

Veterans Day (Pages 21–22)

In 1921 an unknown World War I American soldier was buried in Arlington National Cemetery in Washington, and similar ceremonies took place in England and France, giving universal recognition to the celebrated ending of World War I fighting at 11.00 am, November 11th, 1918. The day became known as Armistice Day. Realising that peace was equally preserved by veterans of World War II in which sixteen and a half million Americans took part, and also the Korean War, President Eisenhower signed a bill in 1954 proclaiming November 11th as 'Veterans Day'. The body of an unknown American soldier in Vietnam was later brought to Arlington. The focal point for the official US Veteran's Day ceremony is the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier where the President lays a wreath.

Thanksgiving (Pages 23–25)

Thanksgiving is always on the fourth Thursday in November and is celebrated by a large meal. Traditional foods are turkey, corn, stuffing, beans, sweet potatoes, gravy and cranberry sauce followed by apple pie or pumpkin pie. In 1620 the Mayflower sailed to America carrying 100 people from England called the Pilgrims. They were seeking religious independence. The first winter was hard; they had little food, few warm clothes, and many of them died from illness. In the spring, Native Americans visited the Pilgrims and showed them how to plant corn. The Pilgrims built houses and hunted turkeys which lived in the woods. When fall came, they had plenty of food and they invited the Indians to eat and celebrate with them. The Native Americans brought deer for the dinner. The feast lasted for three days.

Hanukkah (Pages 26–28)

Hanukkah is a Jewish holiday lasting eight days. According to the Roman calendar, it usually takes place in December. It is also known as the Festival of Lights. It commemorates the victory of the Jews over the Hellenist Syrians in 165 B.C. When the battle was over, the heroes of the battle were unable to find enough undefiled oil to keep the eternal lamps lit. In one of the Temple chambers they finally came upon a small bottle of oil which, under normal circumstances would only have lasted one night, but miraculously it continued to keep the lamp burning for eight nights. It is a holiday commemorated by the lighting of candles for eight nights (the candlestick is called a menorah) and is often accompanied by presents for the children.

Christmas (Pages 29–31)

The name Christmas comes from 'Christ's Mass'. It celebrates the birth of Christ on December 25th, when people visit their families, decorate their homes with Christmas trees and exchange gifts. Many people decorate the roofs of their houses and their gardens with elaborate models of Santa Claus and his sled, reindeer, snowmen, etc. They send cards, bake cookies, visit Santa in their local department store, hang up stockings on Christmas Eve, and many go to church. Families get together for a large Christmas meal (often turkey although many people eat roast beef or follow one of the many European traditional recipes that include fish in the Christmas menu).

New Year's Eve/Day (Page 32)

In many cities in the world, people gather in one central place to celebrate the arrival of the new year at midnight. In the USA, Times Square in New York is the place to be as the huge silver ball drops slowly onto number 1, Times Square at the stroke of midnight. This has been happening since 1906, and each year the crowds get bigger and bigger. Many forms of street entertainment are organised to amuse those waiting to greet the new year. There are big football games in many places the next day, New Year's Day. People make new year resolutions, promising to change bad habits.

Kwanzaa (Pages 33–34)

Kwanzaa is a new festival in the American calendar. It is a time of reaffirming African-American people, their ancestors and culture. It was founded in 1966 by Dr Maulana Karenga. Today more than 15 million people celebrate Kwanzaa. The word means 'first fruits of the harvest' in the African language, Kiswahili. It is celebrated from December 26th to January 1st and is based on Nguzo Saba (seven guiding principles), one for each day of the observance. The necessary objects to prepare the home for the celebration are a candle holder, a straw mat, fruit and vegetables, the equivalent number of ears of corn for each of the children in the family, a communal unity cup, seven candles, one black, three red and three green, and home-made gifts (poems, photos, craft items, etc). People also decorate rooms with black, red and green streamers and balloons, flowers and African prints.

Snow Day (Pages 35–36)

This is the term given to any day when school is closed because of too much snow. Some parts of the USA have enormous quantities of snow, and, although the latest technology means that roads are usually cleared, occasionally everything stops, much to the delight of the pupils. An allowance of five snow days is built into the annual school calendar and if fewer than five snow days actually occur during the winter, the unused days are added to the longer vacations.

Martin Luther King Jr Day (Pages 37–39)

January 15th is Martin Luther King Jr Day, in honor of Martin Luther King, Jr, civil rights hero, who was born on that day in 1929. Martin Luther King Jr became a minister of the church, like his father before him. He lobbied constantly to improve the rights of black people, was often threatened (his house was bombed), and he spent some time in prison. He protested against the war in Vietnam and he also became a spokesman for all minorities. He received the Nobel Peace Prize in 1964. On April 4th 1968, while organizing a march in Memphis, Tennessee for poor workers, he was assassinated.

Groundhog Day (Pages 40–41)

When German settlers arrived in the US in the 1700s they brought with them the tradition of Candlemas Day. In Europe the early Christians used to bless their candles on this day and place lighted candles in their windows. There were lots of weather proverbs connected with this day, eg: *If Candlemas be fair and bright, winter has another flight; if Candlemas brings clouds and rain, winter will not come again.* If the sun made an appearance on Candlemas Day, an animal would cast a shadow. The Germans used to watch a badger to see his shadow. In Pennsylvania the groundhog was selected as a replacement. Groundhogs are members of the squirrel family. The first official Groundhog Day was on February 2nd, 1886. Since 1993, and the release of the film called *Groundhog Day*, it has become very popular. About 35,000 people pour into Punxsutawney for the annual celebrations.

Valentine's Day (Pages 42–44)

There are several related theories about the origin of St Valentine's Day which are given in full on page 45. In the USA, people not only send cards to members of the opposite sex in the form of anonymous love notes; they also send cards to friends, teachers and caregivers telling them how much they appreciate them. It is always celebrated on February 14th.

Chinese New Year (Pages 45–46)

There are many large communities of Chinese people living in large cities in the United States, mainly in California or New York. Around 40,000 Chinese immigrants a year come to live in the States and the Chinese celebration of New Year is therefore a large and important celebration. The festivities usually include firecrackers, dragon dances and processions. People eat special dumplings, cakes and fortune cookies containing predictions about the future, and children are given lucky red envelopes which contain money. People clean their houses, wear red clothes and paint their houses red for good luck. Each year is symbolised by one of the twelve animals in the Chinese calendar. People born in years governed by certain animals are said to share similar personality characteristics. New Year usually occurs somewhere between January and February.

Susan B. Anthony Day (Pages 47–48)

February 15th is Susan B. Anthony Day in memory of the tireless supporter of women's rights who was born on that day in 1820. She was a teacher and a civil rights campaigner. Much of the story of her life is told in the puzzles on pages 47 and 48. In 1920 the Nineteenth Amendment was added to the Constitution of the USA which gives women the right to vote. This is sometimes called the 'Susan B. Anthony Amendment.'

Presidents' Day (Pages 49–52)

This takes place on the third Monday in February and celebrates the births of both George Washington (born February 22, 1732) and Abraham Lincoln (born February 12, 1809). Washington was originally the commander of the American forces in the American War of Independence. He became the first president of the USA. Many places (including the US capital) and things are named after him. Lincoln came from a poor family and became a lawyer. He was the sixteenth president of the US. His goal was to have a united country while at the same time freeing the black slaves, which the southern states were against. At the end of the Civil War in 1865 which the south lost, Lincoln was assassinated by a southern actor called John Wilkes Booth on April 14th, 1865, during an evening at the theatre.

St Patrick's Day (Pages 53–55)

March 19th is the day devoted to the patron saint of Ireland, St Patrick. St Patrick was born in Wales in 389 AD. He was the son of a Christian landowner. At the age of 16 he was kidnapped and taken to Ireland where he became a slave. Six years later he escaped to France and he lived in a monastery there. On his return to Britain he was ordained as Bishop and went to Ireland as a missionary. He established churches in the north of Ireland.

Many Irish people have emigrated to America in the last 400 years, especially during the famous potato famine in Ireland in the nineteenth century. For this reason, St Patrick's Day is enthusiastically celebrated by people of Irish descent. There are parades and marching bands, dressed in green, play Irish music. Corned beef and cabbage is a traditional menu.

Easter (Pages 56–58)

Palm Sunday, the Sunday before Easter, celebrates the arrival of Jesus in Jerusalem and small crosses made of palm leaves are given to churchgoers to mark the occasion. Good Friday commemorates

the crucifixion of Jesus. The name comes from 'God' rather than 'good'. Easter Sunday is the day for celebrating Jesus's rising from the dead. It falls on the first Sunday after the spring full moon, in March or April. Apart from being an important religious holiday, it symbolises the end of winter, the birth of new life, and, for children, it means gifts of candy and chocolate eggs. There are some Easter parades too where people wear funny Easter bonnets that they have made and there is a prize for the best one.

Earth Day (Pages 59–61)

Earth Day was the original idea of Senator Gaylord Nelson. In the 1960s he persuaded President Kennedy to take an active interest in environmental issues and six years later, in 1970, he announced a national environmental teach-in. Twenty million people participated right across America. Since then public awareness of ecological and environmental issues such as global warming, recycling, care for the world's resources, disappearing animal and plant species, has grown enormously, not only in America but all over the world.

Arbor Day (Pages 62–63)

The first Arbor Day was celebrated in the state of Nebraska in 1872, in response to a state proclamation urging settlers and homesteaders in that prairie state to plant trees that would provide shelter, shade, fruit, fuel and beauty for residents of the largely treeless plains. More than one million trees were planted. The idea spread to neighboring states and eventually to all of the United States and many other nations. National Arbor Day is usually the last Friday in April.

Cinco de Mayo (Page 64)

Cinco de Mayo commemorates the battle at Puebla, Mexico in 1862 when the Mexicans defeated the French army. Celebrating Cinco de Mayo has become increasingly popular along the US-Mexico border and in parts of the US that have a high population of people with Mexican heritage. Today's holiday is a celebration of Mexican culture, food, music, beverage and customs unique to Mexico. Cinco de Mayo is becoming adopted into the holiday calendar of more and more people every year.

Mother's Day (Pages 65–67)

The earliest Mother's Day celebrations can be traced back to the spring celebrations of ancient Greece in honor of Rhea, the Mother of the Gods. During the 1600s England celebrated Mothering Sunday on the fourth Sunday of Lent (the 40-day period leading up to Easter), and it honored the mothers of England. As more and more people left their homes to find work in growing new cities, this became one of the few days in the year when servants would have the day off and return home to spend a day with their mothers. As Christianity spread, the celebrations changed to honor the Mother church.

In the United States Mother's Day was first suggested in 1872 by Julia Ward Howe who wrote the Battle Hymn of the Republic. In 1907 Ana Jarvis from Philadelphia began a campaign to establish a national Mother's Day. She persuaded her own church to celebrate Mother's Day on the second anniversary of her mother's death (the 2nd Sunday of May). By 1911 it was celebrated in almost every state and in 1914 President Woodrow Wilson proclaimed it an official holiday.

Memorial Day (Pages 68–69)

Memorial Day, originally called Decoration Day, is a day to remember those who have died in the service of the American nation. After the Civil War many people in the North and South decorated soldiers graves with flowers. Decoration Day was officially proclaimed on May 30, 1868. After World War I the soldiers who died in other wars were also honored. In 1971 it was declared a national holiday to be held on the last Monday in May. It is still a time to remember

those who have died in wars and a long weekend for families to get together for picnics and early summer activities.

Flag Day (Pages 70–71)

In 1777 the Continental Congress adopted the Stars and Stripes pattern for the national flag. This was just one year after the Declaration of Independence and more than ten years before the finalizing of the US Constitution. The first celebration of Flag Day was in 1877. In 1949 President Harry Truman signed legislation making it a day of national observance on June 14th. There have been various attempts to replace the Star Spangled Banner as the national anthem with tunes with 'less war-like sentiments', but without success. Although it is technically a holiday, very few Americans get the day off work.

Graduation Day (Pages 72–74)

Graduation is an important time in schools, colleges and universities in the States, usually accompanied by a ceremony attended by families and friends as well as the students themselves. If the weather is good, the ceremonies are held in the open air. Diplomas are given out and in many schools and colleges students wear academic gowns and caps. The principal of the school and other senior members make speeches, and there are valedictory (farewell) speeches from students. It is a great honor to be chosen to make the valedictory speech, and the honor is usually given to a student who has excelled academically in the school or college. The excerpts on page 74 are from authentic speeches made in the past few years.

Summer Outing (Page 75)

Colonial Williamsburg is the world's largest outdoor living history museum. From 1699 to 1780 it was the capital of England's oldest, largest, richest and most populous colony in the New World and the seat of power in the new nation's most influential state. More than 100 million people have visited the museum.

Father's Day (Pages 76–77)

On June 19 1909, Mrs John B. Dodd of Washington wanted to honor her father, a Civil War veteran, who was widowed when his wife died in childbirth with their sixth child. At the same time, in various towns and cities, other people were beginning to celebrate a 'father's day'. In 1966 President Johnson signed a proclamation declaring the third Sunday of June as Father's Day. It has become a day not only to honor fathers, but all men who act as father figures: stepfathers, uncles, grandfathers and adult male friends.

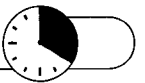
Ben Comes Marching Home
