How to download and edit sound files?


podcast: The word podcasting is a contraction of *iPod*, Apple's portable MP3 player and *broadcasting*. Podcasting is a system in which podcasters offer audio files on the Internet. Podcasting is called Almost Live Radio. In America a number of preachers have started with their own radio programmes on the net: Godcasting.

streaming: With *live streaming* you listen to a broadcast in real time, as on the radio. You cannot download, save nor edit any of these files just like that. You need to record them first.

USB (flash) drive: external medium that can be plugged into one of your USB access gates and acts like a small internal drive.

Teachers find it difficult to select good sound files on the level that they need. And yet, there are lots of excellent materials on the Internet. How can you find, record, play and edit these files and save them on a CD or on a USB drive, ready for class use?

- First check which **players** you have on your PC. Windows Media Player, Macromedia Flash, Real Player, Winamp and Quicktime may be needed in order to listen to downloaded sound files. With the player Winamp you can burn your downloaded files on a CD.
 - If your default (standard) audio player does not allow you to open a sound file, download the file and put it on your hard disk. Open another player and try listening to your file.
- Sound files are often in MP3, WMA or WAV formats. Wikipedia saves its sound files in yet another format: *Ogg Vorbis*. These files can be opened by means of *Real Player*. When you have opened a sound file, you can record it while listening. This can be done by means of a **recorder** like *Audacity* or *Polderbits*. These tools enable you to record all the sounds that are produced on your PC, irrespective of their source. A recorder enables you to record (live) streams and save them so that you can play them later.

Once your sound file has been recorded you can use an **editor** in order to select sound extracts, fade in/out, and save your extracts on a USB drive or on a CD. When saving you can decide on the quality of your extract. If you choose a low quality, you will need less memory but the sounds may be distorted, which you hear in the s-sounds. If you select a better quality, your file will take more space on your drive. WAV files are of a high quality and take more space than MP3 or *Ogg Vorbis* files. For sound files with spoken texts you will need to select a minimal MP3 speed of 12,000 Hz (Herz), 32 kbs (kilobytes per second).

VIDEO


There is an increasing amount of video materials on the web. The One Computer Classroom (see IT) allows you to project these movie clips in the classroom. The largest movie database is probably Youtube. Here are some guidelines which teach you how insert a Youtube movie into a Powerpoint and what types of movies can be found.

How to download a Youtube movie clip?

- 1. Download the last RealPlayer (11, basic) from http://netherlands.real.com/player/win/. Free.
- 2. Download WinFF (free video converter) from http://www.winff.org/ Free.
- 3. Go to Youtube and choose a videoclip on http://nl.youtube.com/. You needn't register.
- 4. Click on *Download This Video* (top right above the movie). The film will be downloaded into your automatically generated file *Real Player Downloads*. Find this subdirectory in your Windows *Videos* directory.



5. Open WinFF.



- 6. Click on Add (green plus) and select the downloaded film in your Real Player Downloads directory.
- 7. Select *WMV* in the *Convert to* window as in the example above.

- 8. Click on Convert (blue arrow).
- 9. Wait a minute until a black conversion window disappears from the screen.
- 10. Open Powerpoint.
- 11. Insert the film in (Film uit bestand). Make sure you insert the clip from .WMV extension from your Real Player Downloads.



12. When you copy your Powerpoint presentation onto a USB stick or other medium, make sure that the videoclip with . WMV-extension is copied as well and is put in the same directory as your Powerpoint!
