

## NUROFEN Plus

You are on holiday in England with a friend. Lisa, who is Australian, has started to develop a terrible toothache. She has taken some aspirin, but they don't work very well. She says she needs something stronger.

You go to the chemist's and they recommend **Nurofen Plus**. You go back to the hotel and **read the leaflet**. Your friend is not very sure if this is a good medicine for her and hesitates to use it.

You suggest she should lie on the bed while you go back to the chemist's.

- 1) Ask him/her about the advantages of this, compared to regular (or ordinary) Nurofen.  
The chemist gives you **3 good reasons** why this is the best medication for your friend at the moment.

(Write down a few key-words here; not the entire conversation)

- 2) You tell him/her **3 things that worry you** before taking it.

(Do the same here)

He/she is very understanding, but says there is no reason to change the medication. She/he gives **ONE argument** why Nurofen Plus is **not always ideal for everyone** in all circumstances.

- 3) You go back to the hotel and **reassure your friend** and tell her what you have learnt at the chemist's. Your friend has read the entire leaflet in the meantime and isn't so worried anymore. From what she found in the text, on top of what you tell her what the chemist has said,  
**She now summarises** herself **why she doesn't believe Nurofen Plus is completely harmless**.
- 4) It's **decision time**: your friend now **decides** either to take the tablet, or not to do so. (The pupils in this role make up their own mind, based on the pros and cons they have heard and read about).
